Art Education Advocacy Day in Springfield: Past, Present, and Future

I know that I am preaching to the choir when I make such statements about the importance of the fine arts. The visual arts contribute at a 7:1 ratio to the economy versus governmental support, on top of increasing student and school achievement scores; are essential to brain development, fueling systemic innovation, and promote pro-social behaviors among other things. None or all of these arguments, factual as they are, have been sufficient enough to cause state government support for the fine arts as imperative in today's educational system. It must be understood by policy makers that the finer arts are not just a "nicety," but rather an economic priority, civil rights issue, and a matter of equitable, superior educational development.

Be warned, this article is a call to action. Positive dialog is starting among government leaders and business media in recognizing the truths just mentioned, and in some cases action is taking place. We have made connections in Illinois, and require your assistance in adding to the progression. This past April, 60+ individuals, which included teachers, students, and art supporters, visited the Springfield Capitol in order to grow support for fine arts education. There have been many successes, which I will outline below, but we still have much work to do, and is why we need you now. On April 12th, 2016, the IAEA in partnership with the Arts Alliance, Ingenuity, and the Illinois Music Education Association, will again visit the capitol. My goal is to have representation of over 100 individuals for this visit. We only need you to sign up now. We will provide the busses, and the education. We need your voice, and your representation. Please go to the IAEA website, and click on Advocacy for more information on how to get involved.

One of last April's big success stories was the adoption of House Resolution 271. We were there to witness the adoption of this resolution, sponsored by Rep. Camille Lilly, which calls upon elected officials and schools throughout the State of Illinois to maintain art programs. The work here is not finished however, as we still need to add pressure so that it can pass the Senate.

Another success story of that April visit was the 20+ signatures received by Senators and Representatives pledging their support for fine arts education. A key component of this success was student voice. If you are able to join us this coming April 12th, I encourage you to identify 2 or 3 students to bring along. I will be happy to work with you on

this endeavor, providing the needed paperwork and logistical advice to make it work. Elected officials love seeing and listening to student's voices.

All told, about 70-75 contacts were made, either by meeting the representative or senator personally, or by dropping off packets and information with the representative's or senator's staff members/secretaries. Several legislators were quoted as wanting to work to keep arts in all schools. There was even an art show, as 8 local students from Senator McConnaughay's district had their artwork on display in the capitol building. We must build on these successes.

So what exactly are the specific goals of this work? I encourage you to take a look at our legislative document also found at the IAEA webpage, but I will briefly outline it here. Written and edited by a number of IAEA members, including myself, and past Advocacy Chair: Chris Grodoski, the document has 4 major asks.

- Visual Arts High School Graduation Requirement of 1 year & Dedicated minimum instruction time for pre-K through Middle School.
- 2. Quality through mandatory licensed visual arts educators.
- 3. Accountability, Assessment and Evaluation.
- 4. Adoption of Illinois core art and media standards.

We have passed a major milestone in the Illinois Arts Learning Standards Initiative: On November 10th, behind the hard work of the Arts Alliance, a final draft of our recommended arts learning standards was submitted to the ISBE staff. These are high quality, thoughtful standards that reflect the insights of teachers throughout the state.

Looking beyond just our own state level success, one should find hope in the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act & Every Child Achieves Act. This legislation was approved to replace the No Child Left Behind Act, and a congressional committee is currently working to reconcile both acts into a final piece of

The Advocacy Roundtable at the 2015 IAEA Conference

The Advocacy Roundtable was extremely successful at this year's IAEA Conference. This was the 3rd Annual Roundtable Meeting at the IAEA Conference. The Roundtable is an opportunity to recap key organizational initiatives and explore new ways to collaborate. In previous years the Roundtable took the form of an open conversation. This year, participants were asked to contribute by providing two PowerPoint slides that summaries the following: key educational initiatives of the past year, possible points of organizational connection and collaboration in the year ahead, and what can the arts education community can do to continue aiding state level education initiatives to ensure quality arts education for Illinois students. Each participant had about five minutes to share.

The Roundtable took place at 10:45 a.m. on Friday November 6th in the Board Room. The participants attending were: Joan Mills (IAEA President), Eryn Blaser (IAEA Advocacy Co-Chair), Amy Sue Mertens (Ingenuity Inc.), Jonathan VanderBrug (Arts Alliance Illinois), Darcy Nendza (IMEA), Cynthia Woods (Director of Advocacy Illinois Association of School Boards), Alison Marley

legislation for the president to sign. Combined, the 2 bills contain 13 artsfriendly provisions, including the arts as a core subject with expanded learning time, the offering of a well-rounded education, the arts increase achievement and graduation rates, and increased professional development time to name a few.

By building on the above success stories, both locally, and federally, my hope is to facilitate a clear and tangible path towards accomplishment of the 4 goals mentioned from the IAEA Legislative Document. We need political support to achieve these goals. In order to receive that support, we must establish a strong, and continued positive dialogue with state policy leaders and elected officials. Please join me and the other art education supporters in our April 12th visit to Springfield to do just that.

We know that they are eager to hear about the conversations and connections that have been created through this meeting.



IAEA representatives shared the goals of organization including making certain that every student in Illinois has a comprehensive and well-rounded education, ensuring the competitiveness of Illinois citizens in a global 21st century economy. There was also a conversation about the legislative documents, ESEA, that combine two bills contain 13 artsfriendly provisions (including the Arts as a core subject) with expanded learning time, offering a well-rounded education. It was noted that the Arts increase academic achievement, graduation rates, and professional development. IAEA also shared information concerning the last two years Arts Education Advocacy Days. Many in attendance were very impressed by the professional development that was offered at the IAEA Conference and enjoyed seeing the Student Show display. Nick presented in formation about the Illinois High School Art Exhibition focusing on the opportunities the show brings to students throughout the state.

We want to thank everyone who attended the Roundtable. The room was filled with IAEA members who wanted to hear and be a part of these important conversations. Thank you to everyone who participated in this positive dialog. Our hope is that the conversations we had during the Roundtable can lead to more conversations, understandings, and movements in educational policy. We all look forward to collaborating and working together.

Stacey Gross - Illinois Art Education Association Art Educator of the Year

Stacey Gross is a National Board Certified Teacher at Centennial High School in Champaign where she teaches photography, graphic design, cinema studies, AP Studio Art, and dual credit classes. She also serves as the Fine Arts Department Content Area Chair. In addition, she serves as the K-12 Visual Arts Coordinator for Champaign Unit School District 4. In that capacity, she acts as a liaison with administration for the art teachers in the district, organizes professional development, advocates for the visual arts, and promotes the visibility of art students and teachers. Now in her 22nd year at Centennial, Gross prides herself with creating a robust art program that fosters a broad appreciation of art and strong technical skill, while stimulating critical and creative thinking. Gross also co-sponsors Centennial's Gay-Straight Alliance.

Her dedication to her profession leaves a lasting impact on Dr. Judy Wiegand, Superintendent of Champaign Unit School District 4: "Time and time again, Ms. Gross has demonstrated

exceptional teaching and leadership skills. Her progressive approach to teaching, coupled with her advocacy for the art program, ensures that art plays a relevant role in the high school curriculum at Centennial and throughout the district." A Quincy native, Gross earned a MA ('01) and BFA ('94) in Art Education, with a studio concentration in photography, from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. She is a practicing artist who works primarily with camera-less darkroom photographic processes to create abstract imagery. She is an avid traveler, with a passion for Japanese art and culture.

Stacey states: "I am grateful to the Illinois Art Education Association for the honor of being recognized as the Art Educator of the Year and to those who supported my nomination, along with my colleagues, administrators, mentors and collaborators who inspire me to be the best teacher I can be and to instill a passion for art in my students. It's humbling to be singled out in a field of tremendous Art Educators, who do amazing work to bring meaningful art experiences to students in Illinois."



Dr. Douglas G. Boughton

Illinois Art Education Association Higher Education - Art Educator of the Year

Doug Boughton is a Professor of Art and Education at Northern Illinois University. His research interests include assessment of student learning in art, portfolio assessment, and art curriculum policy. He has served in significant international leadership roles as World President of InSEA (International Society for Education through Art), Chief Examiner Visual Arts for the International

Baccalaureate Organization, Foundation Director of the National Art Education Research Council of the Australian Institute of Art Education, and Consulting Professor in Art Education to the Institute of Education in Hong Kong. He is a member of the Council for Policy Studies in Art Education (USA), is a Distinguished Fellow of the NAEA (National Art Education Association), an honorary life member of the Australian Institute of Art Education (now Art Education Australia) and the South Australian Visual Arts Education Association. In 1997 he won the Studies in Art Education Invited Lecture Award for consistent contributions through published literature to the direction and scope of the profession, and in 2006 won the

USSEA Edwin Ziegfeld Award for his outstanding contribution to international art education.

Doug has published in excess of ninety articles and book chapters, a monograph, and three co-edited books on the topics of art education curriculum policy, assessment, and multiculturalism (including books and articles published in Chinese, Hungarian, Korean, Portuguese, Dutch, German, Greek, and Slovenian languages). He has given keynote addresses and invited lectures in twenty-five countries throughout Europe, Asia, South America, North America, South East Asia and the Pacific regions.

Doug states, "I am thrilled to receive this award. I moved to Illinois from Australia over fifteen years ago and since then have enjoyed an incredibly rich professional experience working with students, art teachers, and other art higher education colleagues in this state. It is often difficult to begin a new professional career in another country so I am deeply touched to have been received so warmly in Illinois. I feel incredibly honored to be recognized by my colleagues in the IAEA and by my wonderful students who supported my nomination so enthusiastically."



Theresa McGee

Illinois Art Education Association **Distinguished Service in IAEA**

Named IAEA Elementary Art Educator of the Year in 2010, Theresa McGee has contributed to IAEA for many years since first joining as a student at Northern Illinois University. She has presented at countless IAEA conferences with sessions including technology integration, classroom management, and literacy. She has been an active participant in Arts Advocacy Day in Springfield over the past two years.

In 2009 Theresa joined the IAEA board as the Digital Editor; founding both the IAEA Facebook page and Twitter accounts, the first of any state art

education organization. Two years later, she began serving as IAEA State Vice President and Awards Coordinator ending a four year term in 2014. Theresa has been an avid contributor to the IAEA Mosaic, and has had her student's artwork chosen for the IAEA Student Show over the past several years.

Theresa values the importance of connecting Illinois art educators together. A few connected examples include starting the annual Illinois educator happy hour at the national convention and establishing the Sister School Match up – connecting dozens of art educators with surplus funds donated by generous IAEA members. 



was awarded 3rd place. Jessa and Becca were students of Jen Belmonte at Hinsdale South High School. Jeremiah was an independent entry.







Articulate the Need!


The following are several quick tips for articulating the need for continued professional development that benefits your students and your entire school community:
