




I recently read some posts on Facebook in the Art Teachers group. One teacher was looking to retire and wondering

ART EDUCATION ADVOCACY UPDATE

On January 13th, I met with Lt. Governor Evelyn Sanguinetti who was unable to attend our annual roundtable meeting with key players on the road to comprehensive art education for all students in Illinois. The Lt. Governor is a large supporter of the arts given that a love and skill for the piano connected her to meaningful educational opportunities. Even though our current legislative system is riddled with gridlock, education continues to be a priority across the aisle. It's finding the points of agreement that matters. My conversation with the Lt. Governor included numerous points of agreement and celebration for the arts, but also a prime point of disagreement. With intense focus on finances in Illinois legislation, support for what is essentially an unfunded mandate is difficult to come by, and such was the case during this conversation.

I tell you this, because I want all of our art education advocates to be aware of the climate that persists in Springfield. There are many challenges, but also important circumstances such as the priority of education





in our state, federal legislation like the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, the extensive research that supports our mission, and the Illinois Arts Learning Standards initiative, all of which bring arts education to the front of the conversation. In order to strengthen and further establish our efforts of the past few years, and the efforts of others across the country, the IAEA requests your attendance at **Advocacy Day in Springfield this April 12th**. Your voice is crucial in our message to legislators, as there is power in numbers. Please visit www.ILAEA.org for more info and to sign up. It is in these times that a clear and positive voice will remind those who have power of the imperative role the arts have in education.

Of course, I told the Lt. Governor of how an environment focused on graduation requirements marginalizes a non-required subject like the arts and leads many schools suffering from weakened budgets to cut their crucial art programs. Often those less fortunate are the ones with less access to art programming which promote socio-emotional learning and whole brain development. The arts should be viewed as an investment, rather than a cost.

Grassroots efforts are also critical to the charge of improving educational experiences in Illinois. This is why we are seeking other connections across the state. I recently sat down with Cynthia Woods: Director of Advocacy for the Illinois Association of School Boards with this goal in mind. Cynthia was present at our November roundtable meeting and was so impressed that she wanted to forge further connections. Something of unique interest that she shared with me was how there has been a complete lack of communication in her organization about the role of the arts in education. The good news is that there will be now. I agreed to provide an article about the visual arts and our advocacy efforts to the Association of Illinois School Board's Bi-Monthly Journal which is read by a vast majority of School Board Representatives across Illinois. I have also agreed to present on the same subject at their annual convention in November, and to provide links to student artwork from across Illinois. Cynthia wants her organization to join the cause and be powerful advocates for the arts. I do not need to stress how important it is to have School Board Members supporting a more comprehensive fine arts education for their students.

Of course our attention should turn to Advocacy Day in Springfield, but I also want to let you know about National Advocacy Day in Washington D.C. which is scheduled for March 7th and 8th. IAEA leadership has agreed to send two representatives, Carolina Salazar and Alicia York, both of whom are advocacy captains for the IAEA. These efforts are crucial to success stories such as the ESEA mentioned above. We are extremely grateful for Carolina and Alicia's work, and excited to bring their experiences back to Illinois for Advocacy Day in Springfield this fall.

Previous IAEA Conference Keynote Michael Dinges

Schingoethe Artist-in-Residence


The artwork of Chicago artist Michael Dinges opens the 2016 exhibition year at the Schingoethe Center at Aurora University. Dinges was one of the keynote presenters at the IAEA 2013 conference, and will be an Artist Series presenter during the National Art Education Association convention in Chicago this March.

Dinges' show at the new Schingoethe Center is titled "CAST OFF: Michael Dinges". In his two-dimensional and three-dimensional work, Dinges applies a modern interpretation to the traditional scrimshaw process used by 19th century mariners to carve and ink designs into whalebone. A Dremel power tool is used to carve the imagery into discarded white PVC plastic, electronics and other three-dimensional objects. The surface is then inked with black acrylic paint to reveal the imagery.

Dinges began his scrimshaw series in 2003 by using gallon buckets and PVC pipes in place of canvas. In his artwork, Dinges addresses issues of global trade, consumerism, object permanence and environmental impact through his exploration of mankind's relationship with the objects we create. He also incorporates the idea of trench art in his work, which traditionally involved engraving brass artillery shells left over from battle.

Dinges will be an artist-in-residence at Aurora University during the run of his show, which ends April 29. His work and residency are part of the "Celebrating Arts and Ideas" series at Aurora University.

In addition to CAST OFF: Michael Dinges, the Schingoethe Center will feature two other special exhibits through April 29. "Artic Stories in Ivory" was curated by Meg Bero, Executive Director of the Schingoethe Center. "Artic Stories" features artifacts from the Field Museum in Chicago. "Artistic Artistry" highlights pieces from the Center's Permanent Collection. Three new exhibits join the permanent displays in the Center – "Native Peoples of Illinois", "The World of the Kachina" and "It Was Only a New World to Columbus." "Artistic Artistry" was curated by Meg Bero, Anna Pierce and Laura Russman.






Above: Image from the 2016 YAM Poster.

Rules:

- All artwork must be two-dimensional, no larger than 18" x 24". Collage work should extend no more than 1/4" above the surface. No work on stretched canvas.
- All work must be submitted digitally either:
 - 1. Through the IAEA website under digital submissions table on the Student Show Page (www.ilaea.org) or
 - 2. CD or a DVD, with teacher's name and school printed or labeled on the disk. Place all submission images on the same disk. Disk will not be returned.



- Teacher must include an inventory sheet listing filename of each image along
 with the name of the student who created the work, the grade level of the
 student and the medium used to create the work. The Inventory sheet may
 also be downloaded from the IAEA website under Student Show links.
- All submitting teachers must be current members of IAEA (for 2016 and 2017).
- Limit of 20 pieces per submitting teacher or a total of 30 per school. Multiple
 entries of the same lesson will not be accepted for the show. The artwork
 must have been created between August 1, 2015 April 25, 2016.
- Please identify other teachers, including summer contact information on the Inventory Sheet.
- Teachers will be notified of the status of their submitted entries after the
 judging. Accepted original work must be sent to Eryn Blaser at the address
 listed below. Stretched canvas, matted, framed or mounted work will
 NOT BE ACCEPTED. IAEA will provide these services.
- After being notified of selected work, teacher must include an entry form securely attached to the back of each work accepted in the show. The entry form is available on the website under the Student Show links.
- Teachers will be notified of the show work submission deadline.
- Please note that all our information regarding the student, artwork, teacher & school comes from your entry form. Do not abbreviate and please write legibly and take your time when filling it out.

Entry Deadline

The deadline for submitting entries to be judged for the 2016-2017 IAEA Student Art Show is Monday April 25th, 2016. Entries Postmarked after April 25th will NOT be judged. Submit entries as soon as possible. Judging will take place during the early to middle part of May and entries received after judging will not be eligible, regardless of postmark. Any submission containing more than the 20 piece limit per teacher/30 piece limit per school will not be considered.

TAKING AND SAVING DIGITAL IMAGES - FAQS

What if I don't have a digital camera? - Don't worry you can still submit work even if you don't have a digital camera. Simply take photos of the images with a regular 35mm camera and take the film to your nearest film processing store. Most stores now have the option of putting 35mm images from film onto a disk. Simply write your name and school name on this disk for submissions.

I'm not sure what I need to take good quality pictures with my camera. It is strongly recommended that teachers use a good quality 35mm or 5mpx digital camera to take the photos. A good quality image fairs better during judging than those of poor quality. Although a more experienced teacher may have access to more professional lighting, any teacher can use what is available to them to take good quality photos even without more expensive equipment. I suggest working with natural lighting because florescent lighting may cause your images to "yellow." Either take your shots in a well, "naturally light" room with large windows or outside if the weather is agreeable. The best lighting outdoors is when it is a little overcast or cloudy. Try to frame the artwork within the viewfinder so that it fills the entire space cropping out as much of the backdrop as possible. It is important to shoot artwork on a flat backdrop such as a black or even cream colored sheets or other fabric. Make sure backdrop is not distracting by stretching fabric tightly to get rid of shadow causing drapes or folds in the fabric.

What is the preferred file format and size? - All images must be in jpeg format. It is preferred that images submitted have a resolution no higher than 200.

File size and resolution of 35mm images put to disk from a photo processing store/studio will be fine. Concern is for only those taking images with a digital camera of 8mpx or higher. It may be necessary to change the resolution on your digital camera if files sizes are too large to put all images onto the same disk.

How do I get images from my computer or camera to a disk? - As long as you have a CD burner on your computer transferring images or "burning" them to a disk is simple. After transferring images from your camera to your computer you will simply need to use the CD burning software, which if your computer has CD burning capabilities, should already be downloaded onto your computer. Programs such as Nero or Sonic are common CD burning software programs that come with many of today's pc and Mac computers. After opening the CD burning software you will want to burn the images as a "data disk." Simply follow your program's instructions through the burning process.

What if I am totally confused and don't know where to start? - The best advice is to first meet with someone in your building that may be able to help, such as a tech coordinator or a fellow teacher with prior knowledge. There is usually a resident expert in every school. If you cannot locate such an individual, feel free to contact me at the above E-mail. I will walk you through any further questions you may have.



Assistance can mean many things depending on the age of the student artist and their physical and mental abilities to be able to do and not to be able to do certain techniques and steps in making an artwork. We are looking for a balance of student independence as well as assistance when needed.
- 2. The student must have an IEP.

We hope you will consider submitting art works! We wanted to open the doors for all student artworks to be considered for the IAEA Student Show.
