

# **Combining Printmaking Processes with Clay**

STUDIO PRACTICE and WORKSHOP

**Karyl Silerzio,** Retired K-12 Art Educator and IAEA Distinguished Member

This off-site, two-hour, hands-on "Early Bird" workshop for IAEA members, will explore a variety of techniques for developing the surfaces of clay forms. Generously supported by Blick Art Materials, it will focus primarily on the use of underglazes and colored slips with printmaking processes, such as silkscreen and relief, to enhance clay forms and incorporate imagery. Participants will view and handle many examples of the clay/printmaking process "marriage" created by the presenter to inspire imagery and approaches of their own. Teachers will use pre-made screens and stencils along with the ceramic underglazes to create products to use as exemplars in their art classrooms. They will use underglazes on bisque tiles as well as creating custom-colored slips for use with wet clay slabs. Whether the resulting products are relief tiles and/or 3 dimensional forms, teachers' will grow in their understanding and competencies with ceramic materials.

# From the Q Center:

Exit the Q Center at the stoplight and turn left onto Route 25. Continue north on 25 until the next stoplight by the water tower. Turn left onto Red Gate Road. Cross over the Fox River and continue on Red Gate Road through the intersection with Route 31. St. Charles North High School is on your left. At the next intersection (Randall Road), turn right and then get in the left lane for a short distance on Randall. Turn left at the light onto Bolcum Road (Christ Community Church will be on your right). Continue on Bolcum Road, through the intersection with Crane Road for a short distance to the entrance to Fine Line Creative Arts Center (on your right - look for the tall metal FL sign). Primrose Farm playing fields will be on your left. Parking is available on-site at Fine Line. Follow the posted signs to find the Kavanagh Building (for workshop classes and Kavanagh Gallery), and the Barn (Dempsey Gallery and artisan shop).




# Paula Liz

Paula Liz has collaborated on art programs with Crayola,

EmbraceRace, Deep Space Sparkle, and more. As an educational consultant, she has facilitated professional development for art educators worldwide. She has written articles for SchoolArts Magazine and Stenhouse Publishers. In 2023, she co-authored "Anti-Racist Art Activities for Kids: 30+ Creative Projects that Celebrate Diversity and Inspire Change" and individually wrote "Creative Changemakers: Amazing Artists From Around The World."




# Jay Ryan

# Illinois Art Education Association Art Educator of the Year

Judith Briggs, Illinois State University (ISU) Professor of Art Education, received a Ph.D. in Art Education from The Pennsylvania State University, an MFA in Painting from Edinboro University, and a BA in Literature from The American University. A former middle and high school art educator, she is in her nineteenth year as a faculty member at ISU, where she teaches graduate and undergraduate art education courses and is the Art Education Area Coordinator, Art Education Student Teaching Coordinator, and National Art Education Association

Student Chapter Advisor. She has served on numerous university, college, and school committees and initiatives, including ISU's Chicago Teacher Education Pipeline, and, with art education students, ran the Friday Arts Experience at the Bloomington/Normal Illinois Boys and Girls Club and the Western Avenue Community Center, receiving local and university grants to support her efforts. 





This project investigates Chicago's LGBTQ spaces and community through a podcast series that culminated from interviews with 5 QPOC and/or transgender elders. Spaces hold many memories, especially for older people, and the preservation of their knowledge is valuable and critical. This knowledge is continually shrinking as spaces, and more importantly people pass on, and this type of knowledge is often not found in academic papers. The research question posed through this project was: what makes a space safe and meaningful, especially for someone with multiple marginalized identities? Project participants were all over sixty years of age; three were Black, one was Latino, one was white. One participant was transgender, and all but one are affiliated with the LGBTQ+ Intergenerational Dialogue Project, a project which brings LGBTQ+ college students and elders in conversation. #### Illinois Art Education Association A Brief History

The Illinois Art Education Association had its early roots in the growing national interest in education, arts and culture that developed from the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago. A group of art teachers formed the Western Drawing Teachers Association, and in **1919** it was renamed the Western Arts Association. In **1947**, the Western and Eastern Arts Associations joined the Southeastern and Pacific Associations and became the National Art Education Association.



In **1933,** Illinois art teachers began meeting as the "Art Section" during the annual Illinois High School Conference. **This group became known as the Illinois Art Education Association in 1935.** Another group of art teachers called the "Around Chicago Art Educators" (ACAE) formed in **1931** and also provided resources for art teachers. Many future leaders of IAEA were active in ACAE.

In 1948, IAEA held its first statewide conference in Springfield, Illinois under the direction of Dr. Mildred Whiting from Eastern Illinois University. Dr. Whiting was elected the first IAEA President in 1949, along with the other officers who were also elected annually. In 1952 the first IAEA Constitution was drafted and approved by the membership. IAEA conferences were held at different locations around the state over the following years. 2023 marks the **75th anniversary** of the IAEA state conferences.

In **1951** IAEA became affiliated with the Western Region of NAEA. The four regional associations continued to meet on alternating years with the NAEA conventions until the first combined national convention was held in 1972. IAEA's affiliation with NAEA has produced a number of IAEA regional and national leaders and innovative advances in art education.



#### Illinois Art Education Association

From the beginning, IAEA was a leader in art education in Illinois. IAEA was the first arts organization in Illinois to hold annual conferences and to publish an annual yearbook. The state conferences provided a place where art teachers could network, learn about advances in art education, and seek emotional and intellectual support. In **1985,** IAEA was granted "not for profit" status as a 501 (c) (3) organization and restructured its organization into a Board of Directors format.

IAEA has remained proactive in developing programs, materials and resources for art educators at all levels. In keeping with the developments of the 21st century, IAEA has offered information and support to its members in print and online formats and has received many national awards and recognition. IAEA used its wide resource base to provide virtual and hybrid conferences for its members during the Covid years and instituted new ways to share information and developments in art education with its membership.
